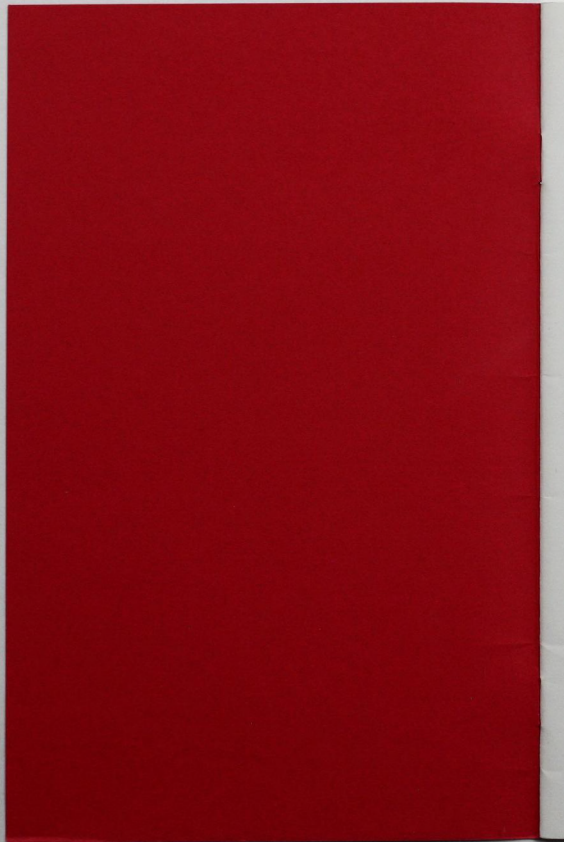

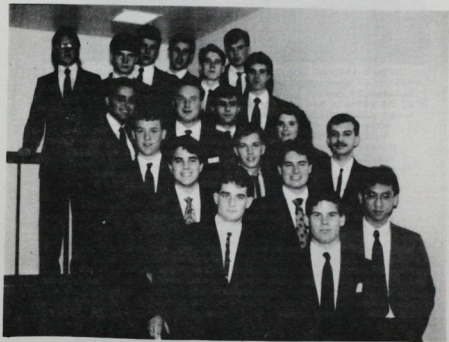

History of Toledo Colony

On May 13, 1989 a small group of engineering students at the University of Toledo held its first official meeting for organizing a national chapter of Theta Tau. This meeting was arranged by a visit from Michael Abraham and Jerry Palardy. Members present included Michael Murdock, Bradley Reineck, Lorrington Harrop, Chee Wong, Ali Ahmad, and Douglas Burkin. The first official officers were Michael Murdock -President, Douglas Burkin - Vice President, Lorrington Harrop -Treasurer, and Chee Wong - Recording Secretary. It was elected at this meeting that this group would be named Upsilon Theta Tau. Before summer break, Upsilon Theta Tau held a few more meetings. Additional members attending these meetings included Philip Hulbert, Christopher Schadewald, Steven Gabel, Rachelle Strawinski, and Steven Thieroff. These meetings focused on plans to petition Upsilon Theta Tau to colonization into Theta Tau. Additional plans included increasing membership in the fall quarter.

As we hoped, fall quarter brought an increase in membership. These new members included Kathleen Lavelle, Greg Orner, Jeffery Pappas, Robert Smith, Philip Thomas, Jeffrey Westrick, Joseph Clark, Lee Staelgrave, Shaker Nazer, and Manar Aborished. With much hard work our petition for colonization was finished and sent to the national. Dr. Yein Chou, Civil Engineering professor, became our faculty adviser. Through social events such as tailgates and pizza parties, our organization grew closer together. The only change in officers this quarter involved Philip Hulbert as Vice President.

Midway through the fall quarter the news was received that Upsilon Theta Tau was approved as a colony of Theta Tau. Immediately, plans were made for our first initiation to be held on January 20, 1990. The initiation ceremony and the dinner, which followed turned out to be a great success. The party which followed the dinner offered a more relaxed atmosphere for the new initiates to socialize with alumni and students of other chapters.

With the start of the winter quarter in January of 1990, a pledge class of ten students was obtained. This pledge class included Chad Altstaetter, Scott Cole, David Ferencik, Lori Hancock, Jerry Higbee, Bradley Jones, Brandon Knoll, Valerie Parsons, Thomas Tamulewicz, and Jeffrey Yoder. With this increase of pledges, the colony became stronger, more organized, and many new ideas for improvement were recognized.

During this quarter, guest speakers were scheduled including Dean Lumsdaine and Dr. Cunningham. Dean Lumsdaine's speech pertained to his recent trip to China and the educational differences between China and the U.S. Dr. Cunningham, member of the office of Profession Experience Program, talked of the importances and growth of the Co-op program at the University of Toledo.

During engineering week, our colony became active in Technorama which is a program sponsored by the College of Engineering to acquaint high school students with engineering studies, this activity involved 100 percent participation.

A committee was also formed to investigate the possibility of obtaining housing at the new on campus Greek housing. This plan was postponed because of the large number of students required to occupy each unit of the Greek housing. With further increased membership, this opportunity will be greatly pursued.

Our first pledge class initiation was held on April 7, 1990. All ten pledges were initiated as members of the Theta Tau Colony.

Spring quarter rush period was also a success, five new pledges joined the Theta Tau Colony. These pledges were Kevin Fahy, Ashish Gawri, Andy Junkins, Raymond Meiers, and Ryan Switzer. New officers were elected and all the positions were changed. These positions were as follows: Philip Hulbert - President, David Ferencik - Vice President, Jeffrey Pappas - Treasurer, and Thomas Tamulewicz - Recording Secretary.

The University of Toledo Engineering Council (UTEC) was introduced into the Engineering College to unite all the engineering societies into one organization. Our colony became active in UTEC. Our organization was represented by Jeffrey Yoder.

Upsilon Theta Tau continued to become more active throughout the spring quarter. There were large turnouts for our social events such as a golf outing and spring picnic. There were also many members involved in our intramural softball team. The tour of the Mazda plant in Michigan proved to be an interesting experience. Our organization also became active in community service through participation with the Friendly Center. The Friendly Center is a local organization involved with guidance and tutoring of youths in the community.

Although most members returned home for the summer, a few remained and introduced our organization to incoming freshmen participating in the orientation program. Four members were able to attend the national convention in Iowa. These members were Philip Hulbert, Robert Smith, Kathleen Lavelle, and Valerie Parsons. Before the beginning of fall quarter Jeffrey Westrick, Philip Hulbert, Jerry Higbee, and Bradley Reineck had the privilege to meet many members of the Sigma Chapter. This trip was a good incentive to grow in membership and activities.

The History of the University of Toledo

The University of Toledo had its origin in 1872 with the gift of 160 acres of farmland donated by Jesup W. Scott, who felt the city should have a university to train young people for responsible positions in the growing community. Today the original land endowment is the site of the Scott Park campus, home of the university's Community and Technical college. The University of Toledo (then called the Toledo University of Arts and Trades) was converted from a municipal institution to state status on July 1, 1967. Since that time, The University of Toledo, in terms of enrollment, has been Ohio's fastest growing university. Toledo ranks high nationally in its ability to attract National Merit and Ohio Academic scholars which verifies the academic maturity and its physical growth once envisioned by Mr. Scott long ago.

The University of Toledo houses eight colleges: Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education and Allied Professions, Engineering, Pharmacy, University College and Law, along with the Graduate Program. These colleges offer a total of 140 academic programs and more than 100 master/doctoral level programs. At the undergraduate level, the student faculty ratio is approximately 19 to 1.

The university has a master plan for the future, ("Toledo 2000") which includes improvement of many of the current campus' facilities, increased on-campus housing, expansion of the community and technical college, and construction of a multi-million dollar engineering complex. These improvements will help to draw more students to the university and increase the quality of education.

History of College of Engineering

The need for persons skilled in technical fields was a factor in 1872 that led to the founding of The Toledo University of Arts and Trades, as The University of Toledo was first known.

What is now the College of Engineering started as the Manual Training School, then became the Polytechnic School, and later the College of Industrial Sciences, which by 1915 was offering the first two years of engineering study. In the 1920's this program was extended to three years, and a four-year degree program was started in 1931 when the present college was established in the newly completed University Hall. The growth of the undergraduate program led to conversion from the general degree to separate departmental curricula in 1950.

In 1960, the college moved to its present location in the Engineering-Science Building. A graduate study and research facility, constructed as an addition to the Engineering-Science Building, was completed in 1970. Construction of a second-story addition to the civil engineering wing was completed in 1984. A computer system for engineering students (the Computer-Aided Engineering Design & Manufacturing Center) was dedicated in 1985. The center occupies 5,000 square feet in the University Computer Center. In 1988, the engineering graphics, computer science and engineering programs, and the bachelor of engineering technology programs moved to the administration building (South Engineering) located at the Westwood Annex. This site will be the future home of the College.

Since the first four-year class of 17 members in 1933, the college has conferred over 8,000 undergraduate, 1,400 masters, and 93 doctoral degrees.

The College of Engineering offers seven bachelor's programs in engineering: Bachelor of Science in Chemical Engineering, Civil Engineering, Computer Science and Engineering, Electrical Engineering, Engineering Physics, Industrial Engineering, and Mechanical Engineering. The college also offers the Bachelor of Engineering Technology degree, with specialization in electronics, engineering technology, mechanical engineering technology, and manufacturing engineering technology.

The University of Toledo is a member of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. The College of Engineering B.S. curricula in Chemical, Civil, Computer Science and Engineering, Electrical, Engineering Physics, Industrial and Mechanical Engineering are accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering Technology.





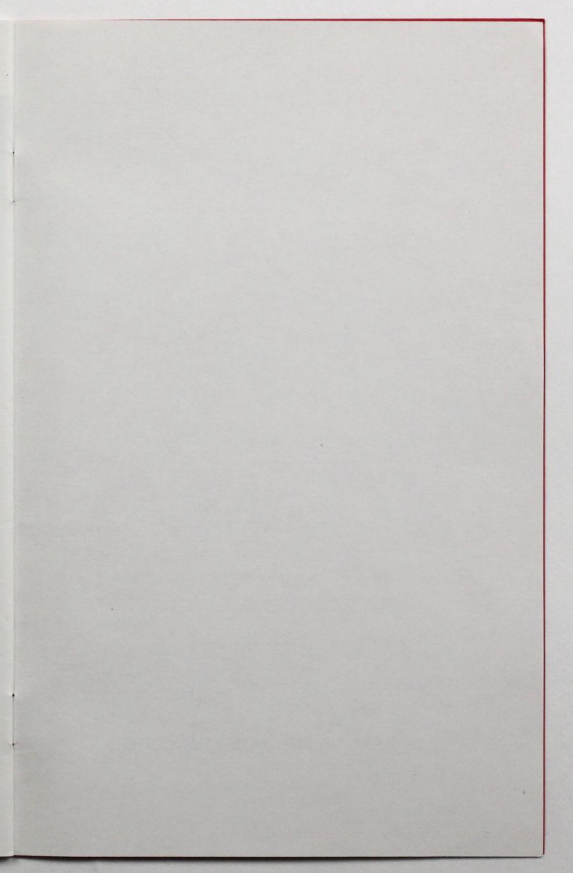
