THE C. RAMOND HANES CONVENTION

Officially named to honor Past Grand Regent C. Ramond Hanes, Sigma (Ohio State) '24, the Thirtyseventh Biemial Convention had as its theme "Theta Tau - Gateway to Excellence in Engineering and Life," It was held at the Sheraton St. Louis Hotel, in the Gateway City, August 14-17, 1988. Setting the tone for the Convention work, the move 'Psain Power' with John Houseman was shown at the Opening Session. At the Opening Dinner, the Convention was officially welcomed to St. Louis by Donald Guilfoy, Senior Engineering Executive of the City of St. Louis. Representing the Host City, Mr. Guilfoy presented the Fraternity with a Proclamation issued by Mayor Vincent J. Schoemehl, Jr., designating the week of August 14 as "Theta Tau Week" in St. Louis.

Grand Regent A, Thomas Brown, Mu (Alabama) "T7, was prevented from attending the Convention due to the pending birth of a second child (in Germany where he serves as Captain in the U.S, Army). Presiding at Convention Sessions was Grand Vice-Regent Randall J, Scheetz, Omicron (Iowa) "93.

The spirit of sharing for the mutual benefit of the entire Fraternity was demonstrated by the greater participation of chapter delegations in making fine oral presentations and providing informative displays.

Those attending were further motivated by Chuck Pierce who spoke on Friday morning on the topic "Climbing the Mountain." Nearby facilities were utilized for the Saturday luncheon which was held on the riverbost, the Lt. Robert E. Lee, followed by a movie "Monument to a Dream" in the Museum of Westward Expansion and trip to the fop of the Gateway Arch.

Parliamentary skills were sharpened by the Saturday morning presentation by Phil Vonder Haar. This was followed by the initiation into Theta Tau of five new members of Epsilon Beta Chapter. There were four simultaneous luncheons as those from each Region met together. That afternoon, a new Convention feature was the Alumin Gathering brighing together local and visiting alumin; and the Executive Council to serve during the coming Biennium was elected. The Reception and Convention Banquet that evening rounded out the day's activities except for the inevitable committee work which kept many up until all hours.

The Sunday morning schedule began with the Grand Chapter Memorial Service. Significant action at the final Convention Session included adoption of a balanced budget and, on the initiative of the student Delegates, increase of the semiannual student member dues from \$30 to \$35 when paid before date due. After installation of the newly elected Executive Council Members, and Convention adjournment, many accepted the invitation to visit the Central Office in \$1. Louis County before starting the trip home. During the Central Office visit, Vernon C, Rohde, 11, Tau (Syracus) '86, presented to the Fraternity the large dark red and gold plaque featuring three-dimensional Greek letters he had painstakingly crafted from tothpicks. It now beautifully decorates a wall of the Central Office where it is permanently displayed,

CONVENTION

A Great Fraternity Experience

At the Convention, special emphasis was placed on Fraternity growth and on increased services to alumni, A seminar on membership recruitment by Kurt A. Selzle, Omage (South Dakota Mines) 98, addressed the need of increasing chapter size. The Student Affairs Committee emphasized the advantages of dry rush and recommended rules to avoid tragedies which may result from alcohol consumption. During the biennium ahead, extension of the Fraternity to additional schools will be promoted through efforts of nearby chapters. This will follow the lead of Epsilon Beta Chapter (Wayne State) which has established at two additional schools in the Detroit area local fraternities which are expected to petition soon for certification as Theta Tau colonies. The signs of office are no longer classified as secret with very restricted use allowed. Each chapter is encouraged to hold a local Rube Goldberg Contest like that originated by Phi Chapter (Purdue) and successfully conducted also by Sigma (Ohio State) and Tau (Syracuse) Chapters with the goal that a national contest sponsored by the Fraternity will be developed in the next two years.

The Convention Banquet, always a highlight of the meeting, was especially outstanding at this Convention. In addition to the traditional Remarks by Past Grand Regents — this year, Brothers Charles W. Britzius, Alpha (Minnesota) 33, and Stephen J. Barth, Lumbda Beta (Tennessee Tech) 97, and greetings from others unable to be present, the program featured two distinguished Theta Tau alumni as speakers, Brother Britzius presented "A Tributo to Erich J. Schrader" including a tape of part of the principal Founder's speech to the 1952 Convenion, the last one he was able to attend. Colonel Joe H. Engle, Zeta (Kansas) 55, NASA Astronaut, shared some of his experiences in space in an inspiring speech illustrated by a movie. For the first time, the Convention Banquet program was videotaped for preservation in the Archives, and for lending to chapters and others interested in reliving or sharing in this experience.

Kappa Beta Chapter (Mississippi State) again won the Erich J. Schrader Award for exemplifying the ideal chapter. (It had shared this award with Phi Chapter (Purdue) the previous biennium.) Kappa Beta Chapter also won the Founders' Award as the most improved chapter, was named Best Delegation from the Southern Region, and took second in the Photograph Contest. Two were named "Outstanding Delegate" by a tie vote of their fellow student Delegates: Pierre J. La Mere, Phi (Purdue) '87; and Michael T. Abraham, Epsilon Beta (Wayne State) '88. Other Best Delegation Awards went to Omicron Chapter at Iowa (Central), Epsilon Beta Chapter at Wayne State (Eastern), and Omega Chapter at South Dakota Mines (Western). BRITZIUS RECEIVES CAREER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Charles W. Britzius, P.E., Alpha (Minnesota) '33, was presented the 1986 Career Achievement Award by the Professional Fraternity Association on September 26, during its Annual Convention held in Williamsburg, Virginia. The topic of his Awards Luncheon address was Private Enterprise and Capitalism.

Brother Britzius is active with the Twin City Alumni Association and on his chapter's house corporation board. He served on the Executive Council for 28 years, including four as Grand Regent (1958-62) and 14 as Grand Treasurer. He continues in the appointive position of Historian. He compiled "A History of Theta Tau" published in 1980. The 1972 Convention was named in his honor.

He has held leadership positions in many technical and professional societies, including the Minnesota and National Societies of Professional Engineers (State President, 1958; National Director, 1962-64; and National Vice President, 1965-67). He has been Councilman and Mayor of Deephayen, Minnesota, where he makes his home with his wife, Bernice, He was named Engineer of the Year by the Minneapolis Engineers Club and the Minnesota Society of Professional Engineers, He has received the Silver Beaver and Lamb Awards in Scouting. His hobbies are hunting, fishing, and tennis. He has been named Minnesota Sports Champion. He has served on the Boards of Carthage College, Gustavus Adolphus College, Martin Luther Manor Home for Aging, and Northwest Lutheran Theological Seminary, and currently on the Board of Bethesda Lutheran Medical Center, St. Paul.

The PFA includes 36 national and international professionally oriented fraternities in a wide range of fields. The Career Achievement Award was established by the PPA in 1963.
