Pi Beta Chapter Installed!

On June 17, 1989, Pi Beta Chapter at Western Michigan University became the newest addition to Theta Tau Fratemity. With this installation, Theta Tau now numbers 23 active chapters. Since 1987, the fratemity has gained four chapters including the re-installed Pi Chapter at the University of Virginia.

Pi Beta Chapter was formerly Beta Chapter of Theta Alpha Sigma, a national service fratemity. The chapter had been active on the W.M.U. campus since 1983, and its membership had become increasingly oriented toward engineering.

After Andrew Wheeler joined and became the organization's President, the group decided they had grown apart from Theat Alpha Sigma and wanted to be afflitated with a national engineering fratentity, It was at the very same time, in February of 1988, that Grand Regent Randall J. Scheetz sent letters to engines schools across the country, including schools across the country, including wM.U. promoting Theat Tau extension. After hearing about the letter from the Dean of Engineering, Andrew called the National Office immediately and the gears started tuning.

After a visit from Grand Regent Scheetz in April, the group began working on its petition for chapterhood during the summer, and concentrated their efforts after the National Convention. The petition was submitted in February, 1989, and approved by Theta Tau in the spring. The installation ceremony was held in Kohman Hall on the Western Michigan University campus. 18 students were initated into the fratemity, including Jon T. Lea as Regent. Dr. Philip Guichelaar, who will become an advisor, was initiated as an experiment of the control of the c

George Washington University Colony

In the winter of 1988, two Theta Tau alumin from the now inactive Gamma Beta Chapter, Dr. Douglas Jones, GB '63, and Lt. Commander Sean P. Walsh, USN, GB '76, began the effort of re-establishing Theta Tau's presence on the George Washington University campus. Gamma Beta has been inactive since 1976.

Interested George Washington University students were invited to an organizational meeting, where the local professional engineering fratemity Theta Xi became established. Christopher Lesnik was elected President.

The Theta Xi Fraternity members spent the remainder of the spring semester and the following summer preparing their petition for colonization. In August of 1988, Theta Xi's petition was approved by the Executive Council, and The George Washington University Colony became a reality. Since then, the colony members have successfully represented Theta Tau Fraternity as professionally and socially active students.

Their growing visibility to the G.W.U. community has been demonstrated by their involvement in campus activities. They plan to spread the name of Theta Tau by opening a campus office in the main student activity center, and also by starting a Peer Counseling Program in which students can visit and be advised on the quality of various courses and professors. The colony members hoped that the office would serve as a focal point, helping them in their quest for chapterhood. Their pretition for installation as a chapter was approved by the fratternity in May.

A major goal of the chapter elect is professional development. The colony members have invited numerous speakers to address the engineering students on various issues. Student members of the Theta Tau Colony have been active with National Engineers' Week along with the Engineers' Council on campus. The group has sponsored a technical seminar on environmental engineering, where representatives from the Environmental Protection Agency spoke to interested students. Also, student members actively participate in the annual Egg Drop Contest during Engineers' Week at G.W.U. The object of the competition is to design a structure that will keep a raw egg intact after a 66-foot vertical fall.

The student members of the Chapterelect have established themselves in other areas vital to an active organization. The pledging program continues to be successful. The pledges have undertaken projects to the pledges have undertaken projects such as throwing fundraisers or organizing speakers to address fellow students. The social and intramural programs have helped students to re-establish the name of Theta Tau at G.W.U.

Ohio University Colony

Omicron Upsilon Fraternity, a local egineering fraternity at Ohio University, became certified as a colony of Theta Tau on November 5, 1988. Nineteen students were initiated, in the Baker Center Balroom, as the founding members of the Ohio University Colony. A banquet followed in honor of the certification. Grand Regent Randall J. Scheetz Officiated, along

Several brothers from Sigma Chapter were also present at the certification. This was appropriate, since the first Theta Tau visit there was made by the brothers at Ohio State University, with Jerome R. Palardy, Student Member of the Executive Council. With his guidance, the group at Ohio U. ultimately produced a petition to the Executive Council for colony status.

Since the certification, the colony members have demonstrated a great deal of competence as an active fraternity. Their services to the College of Engineering have included serving as guides for prospective engineering students, helping conduct the JETS test, and setting up informational displays concerning the Stocker Center, Also, the fraternity offered its services in the Ohio University Table Car Competition, helping the Mechanical Engineering Department by building and repairing the racetrack. As a service to the community outside the university, colony members volunteered their time as judges for a local high school science fair.

For the future, the colony members have plans to star a recycling program at Stocker Center, and to set up a question and answer session between established engineers and engineering students to help give the students a picture of life in the real engineering world.

Socially, members have participated in many events together including organizing a campus picnic and a mixer with the Society of Women Engineers. The colony's intramural teams have also been successful in volleyball and broomball.

The colony's strong reputation on the Ohio University campus and in the community has strengthened its rushing and pledging program. The last pledge class consisted of 16 persons, an improvement in size over the six person pledge class of the previous semester. The increased interest in Theta Tau on the campus indicates a solid future for a new chapter. Alumni Hall of Fame

At the 1988 National Convention, five alumni were inducted into the Theta Tau Alumni Hall of Fame. The third class of honorees since the Hall of Fame's inception in 1986 brings the total number of inductees up to 14. Each new inductee receives a plaque and has his name engraved on a permanent plaque which is displayed in the Central Office and at every Theta Tau national meeting. The new inductees include brothers Stephen J. Barth, Lambda Beta '67, the late Dr. George D. Louderback, Epsilon 1896, Dr. Simon Ramo, Lambda '33, Joseph W. Skovholt, Alpha '31, and the late Jamison Vawter, Zeta '16. At the request of the national fraternity, former Grand Regent Stephen Barth addressed the Convention at the Hall of Fame ceremony and shared some of his life experiences as a Theta Tau.



Stephen J. Barth, Lambda Beta '67

Brother Stephen Barth was instrumental in establishing Lambad Bets Chapter while attending Tennessee Technological University. In 1967, the helped lead the foundring of the local engineering fratemity Sigma Delta Piri. After being officially recognized by the University, the fratemity successfully petitioned Theta Tau to become a colony. Eleven months later, Brother Barth and 20 other charter members had successfully established Lambda Beta Chapter.

After graduating with a B.S. in Civil Engineering in 1967, Brother Barth became active with the fraternity on a national level. The National Convention in 1972 elected him Grand Outer Guard, which began his 14 year span on the Executive Council. He served as Grand Regent from 1976 to 1982, after holding the office of Grand Vice Regent in 1974. Since leaving the Executive Council in 1986 he has served as the director of the Theta Tau Alumni Hall of Fame.

In 1969, after a brief period working for General Electric, Stephen joined Howard J. Barth & Associates, Inc., a consultant engineering firm for the construction industry, as a design engineer. Started in 1954 by his father, the late Howard J. Barth. Phi '38, the Greensburg. Indiana based company specializes in consulting for structural, architectural, and civil design of commercial buildings, bridges and roads. Serving a large portion of Indiana, the firm undertakes the responsibility of developing designs and specifications for a construction project, soliciting bids from various companies, and supervising the ultimate construction project until completion. In 1972, he became a partner in the company, and held this position until 1978, when he became President, a position he has held to this day. With years of experience in this field. Brother Barth has attained his Professional Engineer's License and is a licensed land surveyor.



Dr. George D. Louderback, Epsilon 1896

The late Dr. George Davis Louderback, Epsilon 1896, is honored by the Alumni Hall of Fame for both his renowned achievements in the geological sciences and accomplishments for Theta Tau Fraternity.

During his period as Grand Regent, the Fraternity experienced its greatest rate of growth in history with the installation of of fried from inic chapters. He served in this office from 1919 to 1925. During this period, Delta Brother Louders as a Grand Regent, Brother Louderback served the young national fraternity as Grand Vice Regent from 1913 to 1915. He was also a dedicated alumnus of Epsilon Chapter at the University of California at Berkeley, serving as the local chapter adviser. Dr. Louderback established an out-

Dr. Louderback established an outstanding reputation at the University of California in the field of geological sciences. He served as Dean of the College of Letters and Science from 1920 to 1922 and from 1930 to 1939, and also as Chairman to the Department of Geological Sciences. He was named Professor Emeritus in 1944.

His career achievements included leading a geological expedition to China and the Philippines. He had drafted several publications covering the field of geological science, including faults and carthquakes, mineralogy, and engineering geology. He also studied the geological history of San Francisco Bay, perhaps due partially to the fact that he survived the great San Francisco earthquake of 1906, Dr. Louderback died in Berkeley, California on January 27, 1957.



Dr. Simon Ramo, Lambda '33

Dr. Simon Ramo, nominated to the Hall of Fame by the Executive Council, has had a lifetime of nationally acclaimed achievement in the world of scientific advancement and discovery. A scientist, engineer, business entrepreneur and author, Dr. Ramo, a native of Salt Lake City, Utah, obtained his bachelor's degree from the University of Utah with highest honors. He camed a Ph. D., magna cum laude, from the California Institute of Technology at the age of 23. As a General Electric scientist he age of 23. As a General Electric scientist he attained world recognition as a pioneer in microwaves and developed G.E.'s electron microscope. Before age 30 he had accumulated 25 patents, was made a Fellow of leading professional societies, and was voted America's "most outstanding young electrical engineer."

Dr. Ramo became one of the nation's top experts in guided missiles, being chief scientist in developing the nation's Intercontinental Ballistic Missile System. As the leading civilian contributor to the "largest single program in the country's history," he was awarded a special citation of honor by the U.S. Air Force.

Dr. Ramo has played a key role in the building of several outstanding technological corporations. As the organizer of Hughes Aircraft Company's Electronics and Missile Operations, he participated in raising the company to national stature. becoming its Vice President of Operations. He was co-founder of the Ramo-Wooldridge Corporation in 1953, and first president of its subsidiary, Space Technology Laboratories. After the merger of Ramo-Wooldridge with Thompson Products to form Thomson Ramo Wooldridge, now TRW Inc., he became Vice Chairman of TRW's Board of Directors and Chairman of the Executive Committee, serving in the latter two capacities until retirement.

Our nation's leaders have sought Dr. Ramo's leadership and expertise in the advancement of science and engineering. He has been one of the nation's key advisers to the government on scientific and technological matters. He was Chairman of the President's Committee on Science and Technology under former President Gerald R. Ford, and was Co-Chairman of the Transition Task Force on Science and Technology for former President Reagan. He has been a member of the National Science Board and the Council of Scholars of the Library of Congress. He is the author of a number of texts on engineering, science, and management, which are widely used throughout the world.





Joseph W. Skovholt, Alpha '31

Brother Joseph Skovholt has given a lifetime of service to Theta Tau Fraternity. He is greatly commended for his energies put forth for Alpha Chapter and for the Twin City Alumni Association.

Brother Skovholt guided the Alpha Chapterhouse and brotherhood successfully through the Great Depression of the 1930's while serving as their Chapter Advisor. After taking over this position in 1934, heowrised toolsely with chapter members, helping to manage the delicate innacial situation of the time. Joe began his nearly 60 years of service to Theta Tau as an initiate of Alpha Chapter in 1930. He graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1931 with a degree in Electrical Engineering, and has resided in Minneapolis since.



Jamison Vawter
Zeta '16

The late Brother Jamison Vawter was nominated to the Alumni Hall of Fame by fellow brothers of Zeta Chapter at the University of Kansas. He has been honored for his distinguished career in engineering education at the University of Illinois, and for his service to Theta Tau.

While at the University of Kanasa, Brother Vawter was an active scholar as well as a hard worker, combining academics with its experience working for the Gulf-California-Santa Fe Railroad, After graduating with a B.S. in Civil Engineering in 1916, as a member of Tau Beta to Pi, he continued to work for the railroad and also served in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers from 1917 to 1920.

In 1920 he returned to his alma mater and taught as an assistant professor of mechanics. He moved to the University of Illinois in 1922, taking a post as a professor of Civil Engineering. He remained in this position until his retirement.

During his career in engineering education Brother Vawter published two books: Theory of Simple Structures, cowritten with Thomas C. Shedd, and Elementary Theory and Design of Flexural Members. co-written with James G. Clark.

In his service to the National Fraterinly, Jamison Vawter served as Grand Regent during the Golden Anniversus biennium from 1952-1954. Jamison Vawter also served as Grand Treasurer for 27 years, starting in 1923. He has the distinction of having served in this office for the hotory, for 1935, he was the first Theat Tau ever to have a National Convention named in his honor.

Michael J. Barrett, Phi '89 "Doing the Rube Thing"

Under the guidance of the Brothers of Phi Chapter at Purdue University, the young National Rube Goldberg Machine Contest continues to receive growing national attention.

The contest was inspired by the works of the late Pulitzer Prize winning cartoonist Rube Goldberg, who became famous for his drawings which showed complicated machines performing simple tasks.

On March 18, 1989 students from Purdue University, the University of Detroit and the University of Wisconsin at Madison competed in the 2nd Annual NRGMC. The task of creating the world's most complicated pencil sharpener became this year's theme for the contest. The design criterion was to sharpen the end of a wooden pencil in less than five minutes in at least 25 steps. A group of technology students at Purdue University won the contest with their 36-step contraption named the "Watch-n-Ponder." They were awarded with a \$200 check and a five-foot-high Rube Goldberg traveling trophy. The "Bucky Badger's Hydro-Electro-Mechanical All-Purpose Pencil Sharpener" produced by the brothers of Xi Chapter at University of Wisconsin took second place while the Iota Beta Chapter team from the University of Detroit came in third with their machine named "48 Hours."

Contest chairman Michael J. Barrett, along with fellow brothers at Phi Chapter, set three goals for the 1989 national contest: to generate more media coverage, to improve the facilities where the event is held, and to obtain corporate financial sponsorship.

Without a doubt, the contest has had a greater share of the national spotlight this year. The Associated Press news release from the Purdue University News Service appeared in The Los Angeles Times, USA Today, and numerous local papers across the country. Video coverage of the contest was broadcast on CNN, MTV and the CBS Evening News. The CBS Morning News featured the contest with a live 'via satellite' interview on Monday. March 20. and televised before a nationwide audience the winning "Watch-n-Ponder" machine. The Brothers of Phi Chapter were extremely pleased with the extensive amount of media coverage that the national contest received.

In order to meet expectations of improved facilities for the competing machines, contestants, and spectators, the contest was held in Purdue University's Hall of Music, which seats 6,000 people. Over 3,000 people attended the local and national contests. When Purdue's contest was first rejuvented in 1983, 200 people attended. It has certainly been impressive to see the growth in popularity of the RGMC in the last few years. The most significant upgrade for this year was the utilization of a 200 square foot rear are with the contestants on stage. 
