# An American in España

This time, we chronicle the life of a brother whose illustrious professional career has been mostly abroad.

Lawrence E. Bell, Chi. 49, a Unified States citizen, electrical engines, electrical engines, electrical engines that of the Month of the International executive has spent two-thirds of his nearly 75 years outside of the USA. He has had most challenging assignments in the Berian Peninsula / Europe and Central America. He has traveled widely in Europe and throughout Central and South America, and made a recent month's visit to China. He has weathered two major Revolutions in Venezuela and in Portugal. A high point in his professional career took place in Barcelona, 50th Anniversary Meeting in 1979 of the American Chamber of Commerce in Spain meeting simultaneously with the American Chambers of Commerce - Europe with HQ in Brussels, Belgium (home of the future European Common Market). Then National President of AMCHAM-Spain. Brother Bell was responsible for arranging the Barcelona ceremonies. Bell was one of the Founders and first Board President of the American School of Madrid. He was also a founder of the U.S. Navy League of Madrid. His varied professional and academic interests have included international outdoor lighting standards, solar energy developments, and educational/academic standards. Bell was a founding member of AVIEM: The Venezuelan Association of Electrical & Mechanical Engineers, in Caracas,

Bell was born in 1924, in a small mining town in Chibuahua, Mexico. His English paternal grandfather and father, graduate mining engineers, owned and operated a copper mine near Cusibuiriachic, in the state of Chibuahua, Mexico. Their mining ventures in western Colorado and Arizona had been marginal until they went south and invested in then-modern mining machinery to increase productivity and profitability of their Mexican mining ventures.

In 1921, Brother Bell's father met his future wife in a picturesque town of San Francisco de Borja. The couple moved to Cusi, where eldest child Lawrence was born three years after their wedding. Mexican politics, then as nome; the Bell mine was confiscated by the Bevolutionary Government. The Bells moved to Bisbee, Arizona, some 30 miles from the Mexican border. As the family grew, the children attended Bisbee Public Schools. English was the language outside the front door, while Spanish was the laneuase within the home walls.

In September 1942, as Lawrence was starting his senior year in school, the principal asked: "Who wants to go to college?" Bell was one of two to declare interest. Interested candidates had to volnuter for the US Army Air Corps and satisfy the requirements of a special and unique officer training Academic Course of Study. Bell took the challenge and embarked on the one-year course in

Bell's group was destined for officer candidate field training in North Carolina, and then assigned to the Officer Air Communications Training Course at Yale University. Upon completion of the 9month crash program, Bell was commissioned a second lieutenant and was posted as an Instructor in the same course. Wanting some action before the war's end, he volunteered for service in the Pacific. During a stopover in Panama, en route to Japan, the Bomb was released. In Panama. Bell was assigned to the David Air Base, near Costa Rica.

The Panama experience provided over two years of very valuable international operations experience with his knowledge of Spanish. When the David Squadron was disbanded, Bell Stayed as Air Base Adjutant, having some 17 job titles to his name while closing down the Air Base installations. Promoted to first lieutenant, he went to Rio Hado.

At the time, he gave special attention to long-range career planning and determined that he must make use of his language and improve his technical knowledge so he attended the University of Arizona for three years, became a member of Theta Tau and Tau Beta Pi, and graduated with a BSEE degree. He then accepted a post with the General Electric

Test Program. Upon completion, Bell took a year's assignment in GE Head-quarters, New York City followed by a Technical Sales Engineering position with GE-Venezuela. In eight

# 1999 THETA TAU RUBE GOLDBERG MACHINE CONTEST

The 1999 Theta Tau National Rube Goldberg Machine Contest held April 10 was a complete success. Again, Phi Chapter at Purdue University hosted the national competition,



begun in 1988. The goal was to tee a golf hall in the most complex way. The machine had to perform at least 20 steps and complete the task. While this may sound simple, it is really much more complicated. Some machines had synchronized sound and light systems, while others were completely independent of electrical power. Not only do these machines incorporate technology, but more importantly Rube Goldberg machines give students a creative way to use their mechanical, electrical, chemical, or sometimes just general knowledge.

Six teams, including two Theta Tau teams, were entered in the competition. The competing teams, all winners of local contests, came from Hofstra University, Purdue University, the University of Texas Austin, Vanderbilt University, and two from the University of Toledo (one of which entered through the contest at Oakland University). Members of the Society of Manufacturing Engineers at Purdue built the 1999 National Champion machine. The machine, in the course of 54 steps, had a car race, sprint race, Purdue football victory over IU. weightlifting, and much more. The theme given to this winning machine was the "Wide World of Sports." Placing second was the elaborate machine from Texas. The second place finish was somewhat of a let down for the returning champions. The third place team, with bright vellow construction hats and a big sign. was Chi Beta of Theta Tau. This team, which came purely for the fun, left proudly with its trophy. The Simpsons team displayed by Omega Beta Chapter (Hofstra University) was a huge hit, winning the Peoples Choice Award. Kids and parents both found they could relate to this machine. Omega Beta Chapter has been a participant since 1993 when it entered while still a Colony. It has won a trophy in 6 of the 7 years it has entered.

In his spare time he dedicated his efforts to serving on the Board and later as Madrid President, then National President of the American Chamber of Commerce, At the time, the largest Chamber in the world. His final post was as Chairman of the Board of Presidents of American Chambers of Commerce in

Profound corporate changes in GE caused all international operations to be assigned to domestic divisions. Bell temporarily left Spain and for two years was managing director of Allis Chalmers in Mexico.

Bell returned to the Iberian peninsula: this time to Portugal, as CEO of MLNDET & Cia, at the time, the largest cork producer in the world, with 3,000 workers, three factories in Portugal and one in the United Kingdom. He achieved a total reorganization of all very ancient manufacturing facilities and introduction of cost controls, cork purchase routines, etc. The business was evolving favorably, until a Revolution brought very drastic changes. He returned to Barcelona, Spain: this time as the managing director of two companies: a marketing and a manufacturing facility, owned by Burndy - Norwalk, CT. Bell then decided to work for himself and established Orion Technologies, S.A., a Spanish corporation headquartered in Madrid, representing international technologies and marketing activities. Bell was CEO and majority owner. He also established the World Wide Marketing Group, Inc., which continues with current activities. Now in semi-retirement, he much enjoys travel and other pastimes.

Charles Luckman, Kappa '31, Alumni Hall of Fame Laureate, passed away on January 26 at his home in Los Angeles. He graduated magna cum laude from the University of Illinois School of Architecture. Brother Luckman earned international recognition in two careers. He was considered the "Boy Wonder" of

American business when he became president of Lever Brothers at the age of 37. He returned to architecture in 1950, designing such landmarks as the U.S. Air and Naval Bases in Spain, Los Angeles International Airport, Cape Canaveral Missile Test Center, Madison Square Garden in New York, and Prudential Center in Boston. He introduced market research concepts to the field so his buildings would reflect what the people want. He was elected to the College of Fellows of the American Institute of Architects, served on the Board of the California State University System and on the boards of more than 60 other organizations. He served as an advisor to eight U.S. Presidents and on numerous presidential commissions and commissions.

Charles E. Wales, Epsilon Beta '53, Farst Grand Regent, Alumni Hall of Fame Laureate, and renowned educator, passed away on May 16 at his home in Bruceton, West Virginia. A Charter member of his chapter at Wayne State University, Detroit, his two terms as Grand Regent (1968-72) highlighted 18 years of



service on the Executive Council. Brother Wales had fine rapport with students, listening to them and efficing changes in the Fratternity to meet their needs, such as establishing the position of Student Member on the Executive Council. He presided when Theta Tau's first colony was installed as a chapter at the General Motors Institute. During the period of the Vietnam War, he helped student members understand the importance of a strong national organization. He devoted his life to improving the education process – developing the Guided Design system of teaching. Most of his career was at West Virginia University. He received the American Society for Engineering Education Award for innovation in education. Theat Tau named the 1974 Convention in his honor.
