THE ALPHA CHAPTER

DEAR BROTHERS:

THE splendid success of last year's annual was very gratifying to all of us, and the brothers of Beta are to be commended for the spirit in which they have undertaken this work. We hope that henceforth it will be a yearly feature of the work of the Fraternity of Hammer and Tongs.

All expectations of a successful year for Alpha in 1908 were fully realized. Our custom of holding bi-weekly meetings at the various fraternity houses, followed by a feed and a description of some engineering work by an upper-classman, was carried out very well; and during the past year we have had many interesting and instructive talks.

On February 13th, 1908, Bro. Furber played the host at the Sigma Alpha Epsilon house. The evening was spent at cards and other forms of amusement, after which refreshments were served, followed by a description of "Shaft Driving in Mines" by Bro. Strong. The meeting was fittingly closed by several verses from the famous Senior Engineer Song. The second rushing party of the year was held on February 26th at the Phi Kappa Psi house, at which the following were pledged: Brothers Hinckley, Dollimore, Wright, McGinnis, Sheffield and Curtiss. On March 25th, the above men were duly initiated into Hammer and Tongs. Of these initiates Brother Hinckley was at that time instructor in Sanitary Engineering in the

Civil Department and made an honorary member. On May 13, Bro. Palmer extended the hospitality of the Beta Theta Pi house. At this meeting the custom of having an annual H. & T. banquet each spring, in honor of the departing seniors, to be given by the under-classmen, was decided upon. Following a generous repast Brother Furber introduced us into the mysteries of "The Design of a Two Hinge Arch Bridge." On May 27th the first annual banquet was held at Crombies in honor of Brothers Furber, Dollimore, Strong, Kennedy, Knowlton, Woodrich and Mowery, who were soon to leave their Alma Mater. The six course dinner was followed by talks upon "Sanitary Engineering" by Brother Hinckley, and upon "United States Geological Survey Work" by Bro. Dollimore. A series of informal toasts, responded to by each senior followed, and at a late hour the party broke up.

After spending the vacation engaged in various kinds of engineering work sixteen strong men returned last fall to carry on the work of the present year. It is very much to be regretted that Bro. Hinckley, who engaged in engineering practise during the summer did not choose to return this fall; and that Bro. Miner was prevented by illness from doing so.

The first meeting of the year was held at Crombies on September 24th. After the customary "big steaks" had disappeared, plans for the ensuing year were discussed and the meeting broke up at an early hour. The rushing party for new men was held at the Phi Kappa Psi house on October

14, at which the following were pledged: Brothers Timperly, Du Toit, Wesbrook. Leach, R. Hauser, K. Hauser, Kesner, Atkinson and Bush. Bro. Kesner, a University of Colorado graduate and an instructor in the Structural Department at Minnesota was to be initiated as an honorary member of H. & T. The initiation was held November 18 at the Beta Theta Pi house. After the ceremonies "The Northwestern States Portland Cement Plant" was described by Bro. Shepard. The remainder of the evening was spent in song and such amusements as good fellowship tends to promote. On December 9th Brother Rood entertained us at the Delta Upsilon house. The features of the evening were talks on "Western Experiences of a Junior Miner" by Bro. Rood and "The Financial Difficulties of a Contracting Company" by Bro. Torrance.

So much for the routine part of our life. Outside of this, Alpha has not neglected social, college or athletic activities. Socially H. & T. is to make its debut on February 17th, when an informal dancing party will be given at Wilson's Hall. The hall will be tastily decorated and it is needless to say that "it will be done right." In University circles our standard has been well upheld. Bro. Buck was President of the '08 Rooters Club, Bro. Torrance is Engineering Representative on the '08 Athletic Board of Control, Bro. Leach is Secretary of the '09 Athletic Board, Bro. Shepard is Editor in Chief of the Minnesota Engineer, Bro. Cobban is Business Manager of the Minnesota Engineer, Bro. McGinnis is treasurer of the '10 Junior Ball Association, Bro. Timperly is Engin-

earing Representative on the '10 Gopher Board and Brothers Walling and Brockway are respectively Vice-President and Treasurer of the senior class. In athletics Bro. Kruschke is a guard on the '09 Basket Ball Team, Bro. Atkinson was substitute quarter-back on the Minnesota '08 football team, and Bro. Bush is a half miler on the track team. The others, although not in the lime-light, have starred more or less in interclass sports.

In the recent establishment of a South-West Hammer and Tongs Alumni Chapter at the alumni reunion at Douglas a forward step has been taken. This step should be very gratifying to the Fraternity at large, since an alumni chapter, composed of alumni from the different active chapters can do a great deal toward unifying the policy of H. & T. At its meetings the views of each chapter will be presented and its opinions should be of great value in guiding the present and shaping the future policies of Hammer and Tongs.

With twenty-four strong men in the chapter Alpha is enjoying a very prosperous year and extends her heartiest greetings to Beta and Gamma.

IN this the second annual letter to the general fraternity, Beta wishes to thank the brothers at large for the interest and very hearty support which was accorded the previous annual.

Since issuing the last annual Beta has been up and doing. Not only have individuals distinguished themselves, but the Chapter as a whole has made an enviable reputation. At the beginning of the year, fourteen of last year's active members returned, together with Bros. Barr, Randolph, Varney and Hellberg. All immediately turned their attention to the advancement of the Chapter. Some strong rushing was done. A most enjoyable lunch was served in the rooms of Bros. Brown and Shedwick, after which a smoker was held at the house. This was the first night of the school year, which fact will indicate the spirit which has characterized the entire year. Something was stirring nearly every night and during all the theater parties, lunches and smokers, a spirit of fellowship and good humor seldom equalled and never excelled, was prevalent.

W. R. Cook, a pledge from the summer term, was initiated on October 6th. On the 31st of that month, T. J. Welcker, E. H. Synder, R. B. Wagner, E. J. Haug, C. G. Sheldon and J. F. Bro. Carroll is on the smoker committee at the gym. We have some fine times attending these smokers which occur quite frequently on Saturday nights.

Bro. Wood has been made a member of the Senior executive committee.

Bro. Luce represents us on the athletic committee and although we have very little time for athletics, the school has one of the fastest basket ball teams ever seen in this locality. So far this year the team has not been defeated. Neither was it defeated last year. A very good schedule was arranged for this year including several trips. There are still a number of outside games to be played before the close of the season. We are

very proud to have upon such a team two of our brothers, namely Bros. Wood and Luce, who have been with the team for the past two years. Bro. Brown has also done very well in this line as he is manager and captain of the "Migets."

It is hoped that in this way it will be made easier for the brothers to take care of it, each one of whom is to take what he is able. Of course we hope that a large number will take the stock and pay in the whole amount due at once. The active men have already pledged themselves to the extent of nearly a thousand dollars. It will not be possible for us to start to built at once but we hope to procure the lot this year and to start to build by 1911. This is to be the year of the first M. C. M. reunion. We hope all our brothers will be back for this and be here to see us break ground for a new home. We realize that the largest part of the expense will fall on the alumni but we who are starting the project

have not gone at it blindly. We will belong to the alumni by that time, the present Freshman class graduating that year, so that we will all be out and able to help. No project ever taken up by an "H. & T." man has fallen through. So, brothers, we do not want to fail now. The house fund has been started but the house will not be built until a sufficient amount of money has been obtained.

Another matter taken up by Beta is the publishing, on the first of every other month, a circular letter. It was thought that in this way the brothers could be kept in touch with one another. We hope that they will each and every one write a letter to us, at least as often as they receive ours. We will be very glad to receive any suggestions whereby we might be able to improve these letters that we will send out.

Now that the establishment of alumni chapters in different parts of the country is assured, a great benefit has been done the Fraternity at large. It is our alumni out in the engineering world who are better able to see where the policy of "H. & T." might be improved. With the forming of these chapters new ideas may be better discussed and brought to the attention of the active chapters.

We have at the present time two new pledges, E. H. Stilwill '11 and W. T. McNabb '11. They will be initiated on the evening of the fourth annual banquet which will be held some time in April. All brothers are urged to make a special effort to attend. Not only our alumni are invited,


but the alumni and active members of the other Chapters, as many as can attend, are urged to be present.

In closing, Beta extends to her sister chapters and the alumni the best wishes for a very prosperous year.
